Nara City-Launch of the 'Nara Time' Website

We would like to introduce our recently launched new website, Nara Time (http://narajikan.jp), which publishes captivating information on the history and culture of Nara, as well as stories from producers of Yamato Tea, Kotoka Strawberries and Japanese Sake. Yamato Tea

Nara is one of the major producers of green tea in Japan and the city's tea-making history dates back 1200 years. The tea produced locally, Yamato Tea, is grown primarily in a mountainous natural environment such as the areas of Tsukigase, Tahara and Yagyu in Nara. On the website, you can read stories from ten producers of Yamato Tea.





Kotoka Strawberry

In the hope that the strawberries will become the new specialty (ka) of the ancient city (koto) Nara, this new variety of strawberry was named Kotoka and was formally registered in 2011. The sweet, rich and juicy taste, in addition to the sweet and sour aroma make these strawberries irresistible. On the website you

Japanese Sake

Since Washoku (Japanese style food) was recognised by UNESCO as an Intangible Cultural Heritage in 2013, together with other Washoku, Japanese sake has gained worldwide attention. As the national drink, Japanese sake has been offered to gods since ancient times and has been an essential part of celebrations and festivities in Japan. It can be said that Japanese sake is a sacred part of the Japanese culture. Nara is



believed to be the birthplace of Japanese sake. On the website you can read stories from six producers of Nara Sake.

A delegation from the Ishikawa Foundation came to Sydney

From 12 to 18 March, a delegation from the Ishikawa Foundation for International Exchange, the Ishikawa Japanese Language Teacher's Association, and the International Exchange Division of the Ishikawa Prefectural Government visited universities in Australia and New Zealand that provide Japanese language education to promote the Ishikawa Japanese Studies Program (IJSP). IJSP is a program that provides opportunities for groups of working adults or university students from foreign countries who are learning Japanese to study and experience Japanese language and culture while participating in a homestay program.

They visited the CLAIR Sydney office and explained the program to our staff. The delegation and our staff talked about Japanese language education in Australia and New Zealand. There are not too many local governments in Japan that execute a program for Japanese language learners overseas. It was a great opportunity to learn more about programs like this.

Study tour at the City of Cockburn in WA



From February 28 to March 7, Rina Okamoto, Assistant Director at CLAIR Sydney, interned at the City of Cockburn in Western Australia for 5 days. Cockburn is located in the southern part of Perth, and the surrounding regions such as Fremantle City and Perth City are fast developing as tourist areas. However, the region is focusing more of its efforts into developing the living environment for its citizens rather than focusing on tourism. In recent years, the population of the city has been on the increase, especially the number of elderly people. Rina was able to learn about the challenges faced by Cockburn in relation

to an increase in its elderly population, which is similar to those faced by Japanese local governments. One

of the solutions she came across was a comprehensive support facility providing a program on health, medical care and welfare, a one stop service concentrated in one place which might be applicable in Japan.

Rina would like to express her deepest appreciation to the City Mayor, Mr. Logan, and the Executive Manager, Ms. Margot, who kindly hosted her as an intern. She was deeply moved by their warm welcome and highly values the opportunities provided to her by all of the staff involved during her internship.

On March 8, Toru Sugawara, one of the Assistant Directors visited Chatswood Intensive English Centre to learn more about the New South Wales (NSW) education system.

Deputy Principal Mr. Ashton and the SLSO (School Learning Support Officer) Ms. Fehlner gave an overview on how education works in NSW. Intensive English Centres (IECs) provide intensive English tuition to newly arrived, high

schoolaged

students whose first language is not English. In addition, the IECs provide orientation, settlement, and welfare programs to prepare students for learning in a NSW government high school and to participate in Australian society.

CLAIR Sydney would like to share more about multiculturalism, challenges and best practices in the NSW education space.

On March 19, Mr Toru Sugawara and Mr Jo Fujishima, Assistant Directors at CLAIR Sydney, made a presentation for a Japanese class at the University of New South Wales. The presentation was requested by Prof. Hashimoto and it was a good learning opportunity for both the CLAIR staff members and the students. Mr Sugawara and Mr Fujishima talked about Japanese culture in the Tohoku area, where there are a variety of different Japanese cultures. They also explained the reasons to why there are a lot of differences



in culture in the Tohoku area. We hope that the students can find the 'authentic Japan' in the Tohoku region, which truly represents the beautiful Japanese spirit that continues since ancient times.

Students from Nagoya visited Geelong City



On 26 to 29 March, a delegation of 18 junior high school students from Nagoya visited Geelong City as part of the Wetlands Partnership Agreement between the two cities.

The students visited Serrendip Sanctuary, Breamlea beach and Jirrahlinga Wildlife Sanctuary to learn about migratory birds in the region and the natural environment. The students then visited Geelong City Hall and made presentations to the Mayor, Mr Bruce Harwood, on the ways to protect a Ramsar wetland in Nagoya named Fujimae Tidal

Flats, and also introduced the local culture & food of Nagoya. They also visited the Marine and Freshwater Discovery Centre and Queenscliff Primary School. After the presentation, they, together with the local students, checked out Swan Bay Ramsar wetland, an important habitat for migratory birds. All the students tried their best to communicate in English with the Aussie students. They learned not only about the beauty of Australia, but also the Australian culture and way of life.

CLAIR Sydney helped organise the itinerary and provided information on possible places to visit. We will continue to support further exchanges between the two cities.



Port of Call of the Japanese Antarctic Research Icebreaker 'Shirase' in Sydney

On March 20, the Japanese Maritime Self Defense Force's Icebreaker, 'Shirase', arrived in Sydney. To mark this occasion, a reception onboard the icebreaker was held and hosted by the Commanding Officer of 'Shirase', Captain Koji Miyazaki, Leader of the 59th Japanese Antarctic Research Expedition Team, Dr. Koichiro Doi, together with the Consul-General of Japan in Sydney, Mr. Keizo Takewaka. 'Shirase' carries the Japanese Antarctic Research Expedition Team and is on its way from Showa Station in Antarctica back to Japan.

At the beginning of the reception, the Consul-General of Japan in Sydney gave a speech followed by The Hon.

David Elliott (Minister for Counter Terrorism, Minister for Corrections, and Minister for Veterans Affairs), Commander Luke Charles-Jones (CSC, OAM, RAN, Chief of Staff for Fleet Headquarters (representing Fleet Commander RADM Jonathan Mead)), and Dr. Doi. The lively Australia-Japan relationship in various fields was highlighted in the speeches. 'Shirase' takes its name from an Antarctic glacier named after Japan's first Antarctic explorer, Lieutenant Nobu Shirase, and remains a symbol of friendship between Australia and Japan. During the event, the chefs of 'Shirase' served Japanese cuisine and the attending guests deepened their friendship while enjoying the cuisine.





CLAIR staff attended the SCNZ Regional Collaboration Forum

On March 23, CLAIR Sydney staff attended the 2018 Sister Cities New Zealand Regional Collaboration Forum in Palmerston North, New Zealand.

The Forum was held to explore local government international relations. 
Diplomatic representatives were also invited to the forum to gain insight into engagement with New Zealand regions, and to discuss partnership opportunities.


A little known fact is

From the Director

30 – Introduction of Australian and New Zealand local gov't system
- A Year of Local Governments in Japan

We, CLAIR Sydney, have completed the revision of our publication, the "Local Government of Australia and New Zealand" guidebook, which outlines information on the local government system in the two countries. The new updated version will be made available in April. The guidebook, which is written by our staff members (some of which have just returned to Japan), is aimed at Japanese local governments and scholars and as such is only available in Japanese. We apologise to those who would like to read the guidebook in English.

As you may know, the local government systems of Australia and New Zealand have some differences from the Japanese system. Of course, both systems are based on democracy, are independent from the central government, and are sustained by civic engagement. In the guidebook, we have made a point to convey that, 1) "council" means not only a conference or body consisting of councillors, but also an entity of local administration (the Japanese system has different names for a conference and an entity), 2) a mayor is also a member of a council and chairs the conference (the Japanese system adopts a strict distinction between a mayor and an assembly like the US President and Congress relation), and, 3) Australian states are not local governments (Japanese prefectures and municipalities are both recognised as local governments in Japan).

We were also able to update the guidebook with recent topics, such as recent referendums in Australia and amalgamations in NSW.

We are very excited to be able to update this publication to more accurately convey the local governance system in Australia and New Zealand to our Japanese audience. We would like to express our deep gratitude for the cooperation and support we received from mayors, councillors, officers and scholars in both Australia and New Zealand.
