## Local Cuisine around Japan: Vol.21

### **Akita**



Akita Prefecture is located about 450 km directly north of Tokyo, and shares the same approximate latitude as Beijing, Madrid, and New York. People from Akita enjoy a close relationship with nature and cherish the surrounding mountains, forests and ocean. The prefecture boasts a wide selection of hot springs, the UNESCO World Heritage listed Shirakami mountain range, and many traditional festivals and regional cuisines that have been passed down through generations.

On the topic of local cuisine from Akita, there are various famous dishes such as Inaniwa Udon (an udon noodle dish that originated from the Inaniwa District), Ishiyaki dishes (dishes cooked on a heated stone) and Shottsuru Nabe (a fish sauce hot pot). However, the most famous dish is Kiritampo Nabe. It

is a hot pot style dish with rich chicken broth, vegetables, and cut up pieces of Tampo, a stick of rice made from fragrant roasted mashed rice. The soup uses chicken broth from local Hinai chicken, one of Japan's three most famous free range chickens, to create a soy sauce base soup that is light in texture but rich in

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flavour. Japanese parsley is a crucial component of this dish and when added, it creates another layer of taste. When the chunky and chewy texture of the chopped Tampo pieces are marinated in this soup, it creates a flavoursome dish loved by the locals in Akita.

Kiritampo Nabe is a dish born from the combination of productive rice paddies, cold climate and good quality water in Akita Prefecture. Fermented fish seasoning Shottsuru, and fermented foods such as Miso and Koji were all created as a means to overcome the long winters, and are still popular today in Akita.

Another specialty popular with the locals is Japanese Sake, which is best enjoyed with some local dishes. Sake is also another specialty born due to the climate of Akita. In Akita, one of the leading sake production regions in Japan, there are many historic breweries founded more than 100 years ago; and the tradition, techniques, and pride of the sake makers have been passed down continuously. The locally brewed sake and local Akita cuisine add an extra touch to enjoying the history of the region.

#### <Kiritampo Nabe>

This is a hot pot dish cooked in special chicken soup with local ingredients such as green onion, Maitake mushrooms, burdock, Japanese parsley, and mashed rice roasted in a tubular shape.



## <Babahera>

This is a locally renowned ice cream sold by elderly ladies under parasols on the streets in summer. Some of these ladies have a special technique to scoop the ice cream into the shape of a flower, so if you come across one you are very lucky! The texture of this ice cream is similar to a sherbet. At times, there are long lines formed in front of the small stalls as locals seek out this nostalgic taste.




#### <Inaniwa Udon>

This is a specialty from the Inaniwa District in Yuzawa City located in the southern part of Akita Prefecture. The characteristic of this handmade udon noodle is the chewy and silky texture.

# The Lismore and Yamato-Takada 55<sup>th</sup> Sister City Anniversary



On June 22, the Lismore and Yamato-Takada 55th Sister City Anniversary Welcome Dinner and Reaffirmation Ceremony was held in Lismore. Staff from CLAIR Sydney were in attendance as Lismore City Council had kindly extended an invitation to us. The Mayor of Yamato-Takada City (in Nara Prefecture), Mr. Masakatsu Yoshida, and a delegation from Yamato-Takada City Government, as well as members from the Yamato Takada Lismore Sister City Association were also in attendance at the event. Established in August 1963, the sister city relationship is the first ever sister

city relationship between Australia and Japan. During the event, Mayor Yoshida expressed his desire to welcome a delegation from Lismore to Yamato-Takada City for the 60th Anniversary event, to be held in the city in the year 2023.

The following day, the delegation from Yamato-Takada participated in the annual Lantern Parade in Lismore. To commemorate the Yamato-Takada delegation's visit, the City of Lismore especially created a lantern in the shape of Yamato-Takada's mascot character, Miku-chan, which was on display during the event. Together with students from Lismore who went on exchange in Yamato-Takada, everyone who has an affiliation with the Lismore and Yamato-Takada sister city relation marched in the lantern parade.

We would like to express our gratitude to the staff at Lismore City Council for kindly inviting us to attend such a special event, and we hope the friendships between the two cities will continue to thrive in future.





## Sister city activity written by Claire Stuckey

Having organised and participated in many Sister City events in Gosford City NSW, it was with great excitement that I presented English language programs at Nishi Kasai Library in Edogawa-ku recently. During a staff exchange program to Edogawa in 2010, I was privileged to meet and exchange information regarding all aspects of library service with library staff of all levels. The professional relationship between our cities developed further during a private visit when the IFLA Sister Library



project, Jean Genies, a Gosford library initiative was on display.



As a professional librarian I offered to assist with English language programs as Edogawa and the new Central Coast Council acknowledge the 30th Anniversary of the Sister City agreement. I was invited to meet with Mayor Tada and other cultural representatives in the city office. My husband and I enjoyed a tour of the city including Gyosen Park. My personal offer of programs was warmly received and the adult program "Let's talk about the Central Coast" was delivered to 30 adults on April 14.

Using a range of photos provided by award winning local amateur photographers, I reflected on the diversity

of the Central Coast flora, fauna and natural landscapes from the beach to the mountains. Supplementing the photos with large maps, I illustrated the many green spaces and outdoor recreation activities available including National Parks. The staff at Nishi Kasai had organised an afternoon tea with "Tim Tams" and Japanese biscuits, the atmosphere was relaxed and friendly with many questions and comments at the conclusion.

The Children's program "Let's play with English" was a great success with 65 children and 61 adults attending the library on Thursday, May 3, a public holiday! I presented picture books featuring Australian animals and birds. I also presented a traditional kamishibai story in English. The Australian animal puppets were very popular with the children who clapped and waved along with all my songs.



I was welcomed once more by staff at the special Shinozaki Children's/Kodomo-Mirai-Kan Library. We exchanged updated information on children's library services, programs and collections. Edogawa City supports this fantastic facility which integrates high quality library services with a range of award winning science, environment and cultural programs.

I believe that cultural exchange between library professionals is a wonderful method of developing and extending existing and new Sister City relationships.

As the capital of New Zealand, Wellington is home to the Japanese Embassy and a very multicultural community enjoying the windy city together. JETAA is proud to work closely with the Embassy to connect our alumni members, newly departing JETs, and the local Japanese community together over a shared love and appreciation of Japan.

In 2018, we've sought to increase the variety and number of events that we host, as well as improving communication with our members.



This has resulted in some fun first-time events like a sushi-making class and an upcoming trip to a local cat cafe, as well as bigger turnouts for our ongoing annual events like our New JET Orientation dinner and AGM.

Many of our activities are done alongside the Japanese Embassy's Japan Information and Cultural Centre. Every year, we assist with orientating and welcoming back Wellington JETs, creating a strong bond between the alumni and newer JETs. Most recently, a dozen JETAA members hosted a Q&A panel for the 2018 JETs at the Embassy's request, where members discussed their JET stories and used their experiences to answer questions. Several of our members gave more focused presentations the following day on topics like working with Japanese colleagues, running activities, and handling gender issues in a foreign country.

Another ongoing event we offer – made possible by the wonderful support of the Embassy – is a monthly Japanese conversation night called "Jkaiwa." These nights are well attended and connect Japanese learners of all levels with the local Japanese community over some sushi and friendly conversation. At the end of last year, Jkaiwa had a bonenkai with a Wellington twist: a pub quiz. Groups of Japanese and Kiwi friends gathered

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around to answer tricky Japan trivia over local food and drink. In addition to Jkaiwa, JETAA Wellington also organises Japanese language lessons, which run over several weeks a few times a year. We're proud to say that many new JETs over the years practiced their Japanese with us before heading to Japan!



This year will see the return of Wellington's biannual Japan Festival. Our members and other JET alumni are taking an active part in organising the festival alongside the Embassy and Wellington's Japanese organisations. During 2016's event, JETAA Wellington ran a very successful taiyaki booth and a stamp rally with other local groups and businesses, both of which we plan to continue. Speaking of taiyaki, we were happy to bring it out to nearby Lower Hutt for their inaugural Japan Day, which featured tonnes of great food, music performances, and handcrafts.

Wellington is a "foodie" city, and so of course we also enjoy a number of Japanese food events! We've had hands-on classes about making bento boxes - hosted by a local JET alumni who now runs a bento-making business. Another alumni member now in the Japanese food business taught us how to roll sushi. We've also hosted okonomiyaki parties, casual dinners, and a few nomikai as well.

Whether it's acting as formal, suited-up representatives of the Programme at the Embassy, or having some casual fun while talking about our adventures in Japan, JETAA Wellington greatly enjoys helping its members and the wider Wellington community stay connected with Japan. After the recent JETAA Oceania conference in Auckland, we're full of new, exciting ideas and are very much looking forward to our next fun event!
